

The law and Shakespeare tangle into an ethical quagmire in this unique course.

This course immerses participants in in-depth discussions and analyses of ethical behavior and justice at the intersection of law, literature, and life experience. The curriculum employs a two-text approach: the literary text and the "life text" — the personal experiences of the judge engaging in the discussions.

A key aspect of the course is a focus on creative practice and its positive impacts on judicial ethics and decision-making. What can literature, poetry, and art teach us about ethics and justice? Through a survey of their roles in justice movements and their presence in courts, participants will explore how these forms of creative expression — from poetry and short stories to visual art and theater — can shape and challenge ethical perspectives.

Participants attend plays at the Oregon Shakespeare Festival and discuss the ethical dilemmas posed within the plays as the dilemmas relate to the judiciary. The Oregon Shakespeare Festival was founded in 1935. Ashland, Oregon is located in the southern part of the state near the Oregon Coast, Redwood National and State Parks, and Crater Lake National Park.
