



The Traffic Case: A Course for Nonlawyer Judges

Nonlawyer judges may preside over cases involving impaired driving, which is a crime in all 50 states. Criminal matters such as impaired driving can include issues concerning due process, the 6th Amendment, and the right to a fair trial. This course is specially designed to give nonlawyer judges a solid foundation in evidence admissibility, the flow of a trial from beginning to end, case management, sentencing and more.

During this course, you will learn to:

1. Recognize the important roles judges play in efficiently, ethically, and effectively handling impaired driving cases.
2. Identify, analyze, and rule on constitutional issues that arise during the trial of impaired driving cases.;
3. Cite the current practices and the role of forensic toxicology in impaired driving cases; and
4. Examine the basics of Rules of Evidence.
