Your journey to the bench starts here.

Deciding to make the move from bar to bench is a decision filled with uncertainties and often complex pathways. The National Judicial College has created the one-of-a-kind program designed to assist attorneys in navigating the journey from attorney to judge.

During this weeklong course, participants will learn if a career on the bench is right for them and how to pursue a judicial position, whether the jurisdiction utilizes an appointment or election process. The course tackles campaign ethics, social media, judicial ethics, campaign finance, public and private interviews, and other issues that commonly arise. The course also includes sessions on decision-making, security, winding down a practice, and conflicts of interest so attorneys can take the bench with confidence. Expert faculty include current judges, retired judges, state supreme court chief justices and appointment and election specialists.

Development of application materials and interview skills are also a key feature of the course.
